The 2014/15 financial year was a year of transition for us. We were buoyed by our achievement of the Mid-Sized Thai NGO of the Year award from the Resource Alliance and the Rockefeller Foundation, and continued to ride that momentum forward – assessing our past achievements and future opportunities, and planning for a successful next 15 years. As part of this, we worked with a team of consultants from Penn International Impact Consulting to develop ways to monitor our impact and measure our success, and we held our first gala event, generously sponsored by ThaiBev, raising almost \$30,000 USD.

More recently still, we changed our name from the Goodwill Group Foundation to the Pratthanadee Foundation. Pratthanadee is a beautiful, often-used phrase in Thailand to wish people well – quite simply, to send them goodwill. It is fitting for us, as our motivation is exactly that, to capture the goodwill of donors, teachers and volunteers and transform it into effective training and an empowering community, serving the needs of disadvantaged women and girls in Thailand.

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## Introducing Pratthanadee

**The Pratthanadee Foundation (formerly the Goodwill Group Foundation) is a Thai registered non-governmental organization based in Bangkok, Thailand with a second branch in Ubon Ratchathani province in the Northeast of Thailand. Pratthanadee was founded on December 8, 2000, is registered under the Office of the National Culture Commission in Thailand (license number: Tor 490/2543 and registry number: Kor Thor 1158) and is a registered 501 c (3) tax-exempt organization in the United States.**



As a young girl growing up in rural Thailand, there are few opportunities for education, training and employment. Thousands of young women move to Bangkok each year, looking for work to support parents, grandparents, younger siblings and sometimes their own children back home.

These women arrive in the city with little preparation, no savings, no connections and no real, marketable skills. Their opportunities in Bangkok are limited – factory work, domestic labor, cleaning and sometimes worse. With stark choices and growing financial pressure, they often become trapped in informal, underpaid or unsafe work. The Pratthanadee Foundation works with these women to improve their economic opportunities and to prevent young girls from falling into the same traps. Pratthanadee offers a schedule of free career and personal development workshops for women and girls in Bangkok and Ubon Ratchathani in the Northeast of Thailand.

Pratthanadee strives to help those who have limited marketable vocational skills and who cannot afford to pursue higher education. The courses are run according to demand within the community, feedback from earlier training programs and gaps in service provision.

Pratthanadee serves two main groups: women who are unemployed or in employment that is unstable, unsafe or underpaid; and girls from poor backgrounds, who are at a crucial point in making decisions about their futures. From English language and computer skills to self-defense and job interview preparation, Pratthanadee's workshops make a real difference to women's lives. We create a welcoming community, where women feel supported and valued as they take the first step to a brighter future.

## How Pratthanadee Works

We help women in Thailand who are:

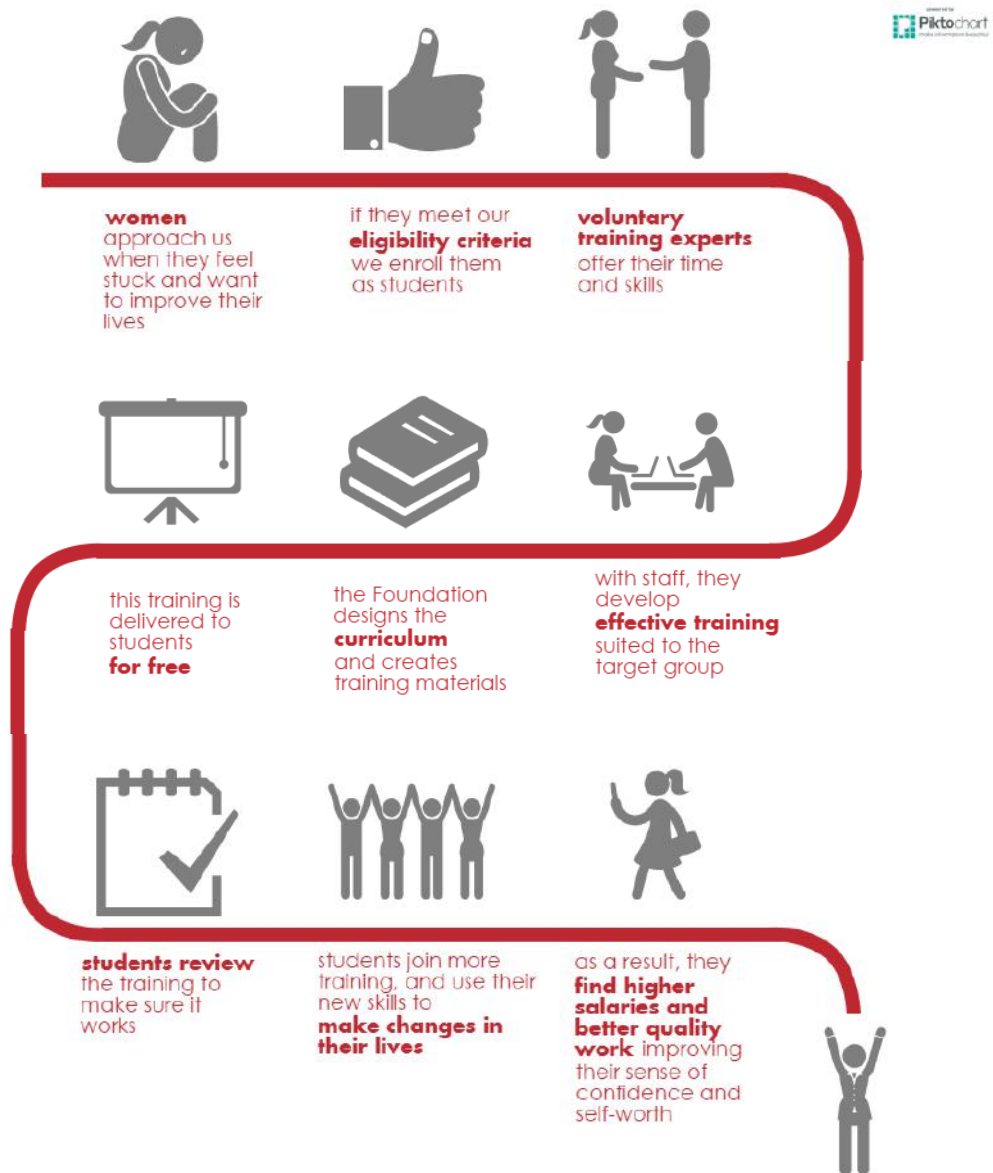
- Working a hand-to-mouth existence in low paid, dangerous or demeaning work.
- Undereducated and low skilled, and unsure how to move beyond this.
- Carrying the responsibility of supporting children and family upcountry with very low wages.
- Leading a lifestyle that is damaging their self-confidence, health, and their relationships with children and family.

Our mission is to capture the generosity of donors and volunteers and transform it into free high-quality training and support for disadvantaged women, inspiring a new generation of confident, motivated and resilient women.

We aim for Pratthanadee's women to be actively seeking to realize their career and work aspirations, by:

- Securing higher quality employment with better working conditions.
- Securing a promotion or a pay rise.
- Taking on further training or education to meet their career goals.

By taking control of their own lives, our women are able to start moving towards independence and financial security, reducing overreliance on unhealthy jobs, relationships and loans.



## Training in the 2014/15 Financial Year: In Numbers

- **706** girls in Bangkok and **253** girls in Ubon Ratchathani plotted career and educational success in a Preparing for Success workshop.
- **166** women enrolled in one of **17** weekly English language courses.
- **135** women and girls in Bangkok and **536** in Ubon learned First Aid and CPR.
- **954** girls in Bangkok and **1,779** in Ubon were trained in recognizing, avoiding and responding to dangerous situations.
- **164** women took part in other career and personal development options, including: Career-Specific English (specialized workshops on vocabulary required in different professions), Computer Training (covering the Microsoft Office package), Make-Up and Self-Presentation (sponsored by Shiseido), Professional Child Care Certificate, Job Interview Training, Building a Small Business, and Salary Negotiation.
- **485** women and girls in Bangkok and **1,779** in Ubon were trained in self-defense.

## Meet our Students



### Praew's Story

"I came to Bangkok in 2009 when I was 19 years old. I was brought up by my grandmother.

I wanted to study, but my family didn't want me to carry on at school. If I carried on studying, they would drive me out of the house. They threw all my study books in the bin.

I had to come to Bangkok to work instead. Now I work in a kindergarten. If I didn't get this job here, I don't know what my life would be like right now.

Since starting at Pratthanadee, I have had a chance to learn many things I didn't know before. Without Pratthanadee, I would not see or meet new friends. I would never learn new skills or see what the world is like outside of my job.

I cannot even miss one week of Pratthanadee. It gives me the feeling that I can be in control of my life. That I can depend on myself."



### Oranuch's Story

"I have been studying at Pratthanadee for three years. When I was a child, I helped my parents and worked for them. I only finished primary school at grade 2.

I came to Bangkok when I was 12 years old. I felt scared, because I had never left my parents before and I was going to be here alone. I came here to earn money. At that time, we lived from hand to mouth.

I started working as maid. I was there altogether for 11 years.

My friend recommended Pratthanadee to me, so I came to apply. Now I can speak English. I have met a lot of friends. It feels like home and I feel warm when I'm here.

If there was no Pratthanadee, my life would just be the same as in the past, with no opportunities or chances. I didn't have much freedom in the past. Today, I have much more freedom and more choices to find a job."





### Paramee's Story

"I have been coming to Pratthanadee for 4 years now.

When I grew up, my parents were farmers and owned a small grocery shop. I have four brothers and sisters. I am the youngest. When I was 6 years old, my mother passed away. That changed my life a lot.

After my mother passed away, my oldest sister moved up from primary school but the rest of us could not continue to study. It was hard. I only went to primary school.

I moved to Bangkok to work. I wanted to make more money, because there are very few jobs for me upcountry. I didn't finish a high enough level of education.

It is not easy to come to Bangkok. I needed to work hard to earn enough money to pay for all the new expenses, like rent. Sometimes I needed to send money home, even when I didn't have enough. So I worked very hard and did lots of overtime.

The hardest thing is working alone to support my child. Most Thai women are single mothers and have to take care of their kid and their family, especially women from upcountry. We have to persevere and work very hard to move up in society, since we start from zero. It is not easy.

After I gave birth, my baby was with me in Bangkok. I didn't want to send my kid to live with my relatives but I need to earn money and I need to work. So I made my decision.

I'm trying to go back to my hometown more often, like two or three times a year. I have to accept it. When I go home, my kid always asks me, 'Why don't you stay longer?' And I have to say, 'I can't. I have to get back to Bangkok and work, to earn money, so that we can afford things'.

When I first came to Pratthanadee, I was excited and impressed by the kindness of the teachers and staff. I have a good social life now and met new friends. I feel warm here.

Since I started coming to Pratthanadee, I can speak more English, so I changed my job to work in an area where I can use the language. I am so proud that I can work to take care of myself and my child, and also to take care of my family."



## Penn International Impact Consulting



In May, Pratthanadee's staff welcomed a team of five consultants from Penn International Impact Consulting (PIIC), a student consulting organization at the University of Pennsylvania.

Penn International Impact Consulting provides pro-bono consulting services to NGOs across the globe.

Their mission is to: "Identify and build relationships with high potential NGOs in developing countries, move them towards sustainability, and enhance global long-term social impact."

The selection process is very stringent and it was an honor for Pratthanadee to be chosen.

The consultants spent a week at our Bangkok office and a week in Ubon Ratchathani. They interviewed women in the community, observed classes and training programs, and designed new impact analysis and program design processes to support Pratthanadee's future development.





## Bangkok Focus Groups



To find out what our students need most from us, in September we ran two focus groups with a total of 32 students in Bangkok. Here is a summary of our findings, which we are using to inform our program design:

- Our students have few marketable skills, but are keen to improve their prospects. Most of them moved from a rural area to find work.
- They work in the informal sector or in low-skilled labor. Generally in domestic service as maids and nannies, or as employees in sales, massage parlors, beauty shops and hotels.
- Those in the informal sector are not guaranteed access to social security or health insurance. They face unstable income, lack of benefits and responsibilities increasing without an increase in pay (such as women hired as maids also becoming nannies).
- Live-in domestic workers have particular issues around drawing boundaries with their employers to ensure that they are not on call 24/7.
- Our students either do not know about their rights or are scared to confront their employer. This was highlighted as a possible result of the move from agricultural family-based work to employment, without appropriate guidance on what is and is not a fair request.
- Our students have often not thought much about the future or planned in case of losing their job, needing time off work or paying for health care. They find it difficult to think beyond the day to day.
- Many have children to support, either back home or in the city, but nobody else to help them.



## Stop Violence against Women



Violence against women continues to be a pervasive issue in Thailand today. According to a report from UN Women:

*“44% of women in Thailand in 2005 reported having experienced physical and/or sexual violence by an intimate partner. More than 7 in 10 women in rural Thailand agreed that there are reasons that justify a man beating his wife. Only 20% of physically abused women in Bangkok and 10% in Nakhonsawan had ever turned to formal services (health, police, religious or local leaders, etc.) for help.”*

In December, our team in Ubon Ratchathani and four volunteers took part in the Stop the Violence against Women parade to help raise awareness and challenge attitudes.

Nang, Pratthanadee’s Program Coordinator, was presented with a certificate in recognition of the Foundation’s work on the day.

Our training in high schools teaches young girls how to recognize and avoid dangerous situations, to make use of laws and services to protect themselves, to claim their rights, and – as a last resort – some basic techniques of self-defense.

We hope that, school by school and community by community, we will begin to make the change needed to impact this important issue.

**What has been different to how you expected?**

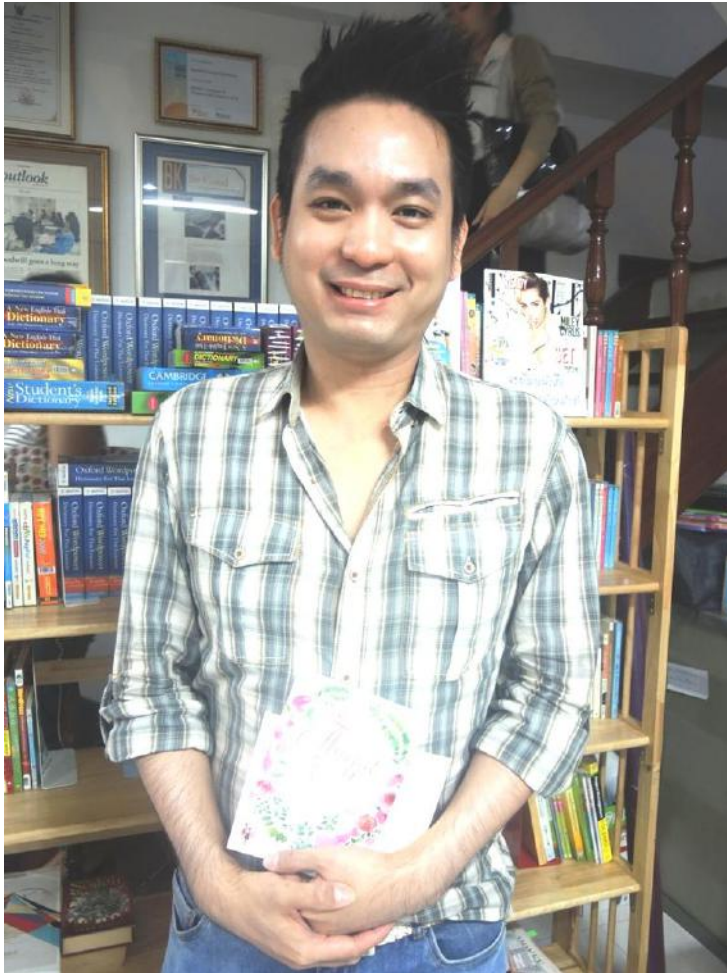
With the observation of a few classes and the opportunity to do some supply teaching, I pretty much knew what to expect. That's why I like it! There are no big surprises and it's all very well organized.

These women come on their only day off work, so you have to make sure that there is always enough room for personal stories or a little bit of "sanuk" (fun).

And of course it's a great thing to support! It's a highly rewarding challenge and has brought me so far as a teacher and a person.

**How long have you been volunteering at Pratthanadee?**

The date of my application was February, 2000. It's been 16 years.

**What is the best thing about it?**

I have witnessed improvement of life in a lot of students. They show that they understand more English and are able to use computers. These two skills are tools which they can use to move on with their lives and careers.

They come to the Foundation with smiling faces and finish their classes with happiness, knowing that they can make use of what they learn. I want to make society better. I have accomplished that goal every time I go to teach a class.

**What has been different to how you expected?**

I thought Pratthanadee would stay just a small foundation, with a handful of students, offering a few courses. But I have watched the foundation grow to offer more and more each day.

It was not that I expected less. It just exceeds my expectations, which I can't be happier about it, for it means more people will get the help they need and other added value to their lives.

**What would you say to others thinking of volunteering?**

Helping others is not only fulfilling but also rewarding. With just a few hours a week at the Pratthanadee Foundation, you can actually change someone's life and help them have a chance to improve life for their families.

## Goodwill Group Foundation

Empowering Underprivileged Thai Women through Education

**W**hen the sun rises, the lights fade. Traces of the night exist only in the air. The smell of stale alcohol, wet cigarettes, and despair permeates the sex industry. For women who move to Bangkok in search of a better life for themselves and their families, this scene — this smell — is never what they had imagined. Yet year in, year out, thousands of Thai women migrate to the capital, anyway, often without formal education or the training needed to find sustainable work outside the demimonde.

Fifteen years ago, Enrique Ouan established the Goodwill Group Foundation to teach English to disadvantaged Thai women. Most of the students had come from upcountry, especially Ubon Ratchathani, and were stuck in a cycle of irregular and underpaid work. Not all were sex workers, and not all would be, but the decisions they had to grapple with were nevertheless disheartening. Dreams of sending money to family disappeared as the reality of life in Bangkok sank in, and the opportunities that once seemed so abundant were whittled to few.

After four years in operation, the team at Goodwill realized they could have a greater impact through their work — that they had the ability to empower women while still providing free English language courses. Soon, Goodwill expanded the scope of its programmes to provide personal and career development, from vocational training to mentoring and even women's health classes.

"Approximately 80 per cent of the women we serve have irregular work, in which they face an insecure income (each month) and a lack of social welfare," says Orapan Pratomeki, or Kate, who works as the office manager of the private non-profit. "We build their capacity through programmes like rights and laws for domestic workers, job interview practice, salary negotiation, and professional training for nannies and domestic workers. In addition, we also offer job placement to help to our students find better work with fairer conditions."

Students range from 16 to 35 years in age. Some are mothers. Others provide for their families despite being mired in poverty. Some are sex workers. Others struggle to stay out

of the industry. Some are migrants or dropouts or adults who never had the opportunity to go to school.

"We believe that education can come in many channels and forms, [and so] we offer training designed to improve our students' marketable skills. Many women we serve are able to become employed in skilled labour even though they only trained primary school."

Among the courses offered at Goodwill are English and computer training. With the ability to communicate and use a computer proficiently, many women have found jobs as receptionists or administrative workers. Some have become personal assistants, nannies, or domestic workers for foreign employers, thanks to English, first aid, and self-defense skills. They have also been able to ask for raises and negotiate better working conditions.

Long odds have lessened. Still, the illusion of easy money lingers like a desert mirage. "We don't try to convince our students [to stay out of the sex industry], but we do provide them with advice and guidance and access to other options to encourage them to choose their own future," says Kate.

Despite not recruiting or advertising, Goodwill is seeing more and more women enrolling in its programmes, thanks to recommendations from friends, current students, and volunteers. It has also gained familiarity by working closely with community leaders and schools to prevent women and girls from falling into the hands of human traffickers, risking exploitation and violence.

In 2011, a second branch of Goodwill opened in Ubon Ratchathani. It was designed to give high school girls crucial information they migrate to Bangkok, without sufficient skills or planning, to look for work. Women are then guided to the main branch in Bangkok, where they have a support system and can continue learning. As Kate says, "Education is the best long-term investment."

As well as English language teachers, Goodwill always seeks qualified volunteers with specific skills in self-defence, first aid and CPR, marketing, and fund-raising. 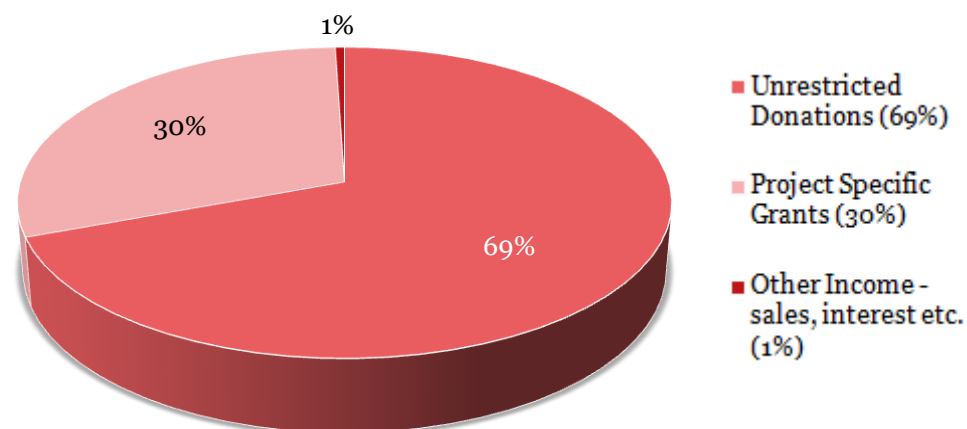

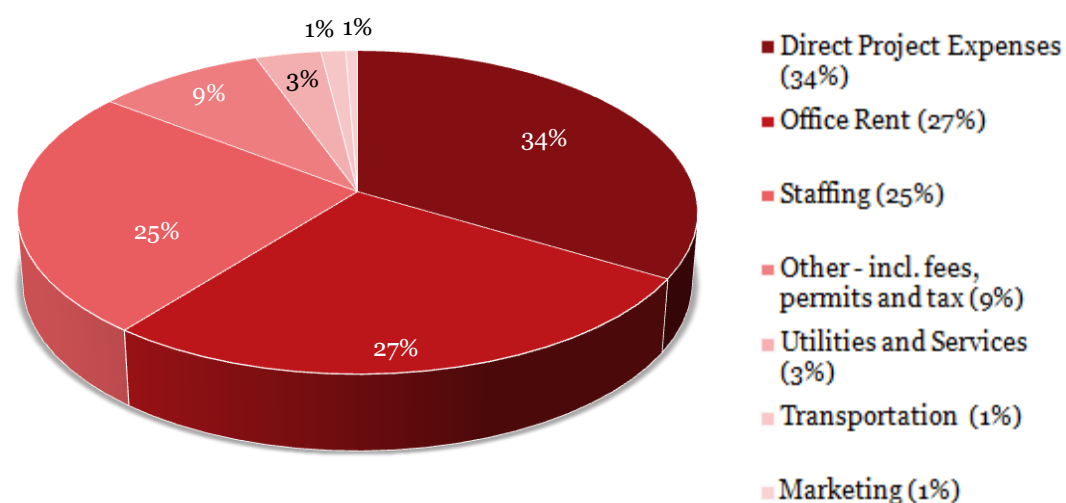
